What does the N.C. ADFP Trust Fund do?

- Assist in the preservation of N.C.'s agricultural economy by providing grants to county governments and non-profit organizations for *conservation easements, agricultural plans and development projects*.
 - Encourages the preservation of qualifying agricultural, horticultural and forestlands to *foster the growth, development and sustainability of family farms*.
 - Prioritize grant funding for *maximum match resource utilization* from private, local and federal constituent partners.

*The North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services has preserved **18,498 acres of farm and forest lands**.*

- The ADFP Trust Fund will preserve another **2,653 acres** by the end of 2019 based on current contract schedules.
 - To date, ADFP Trust Fund grant recipients have secured over **\$50 million** in matching funds.
 - ADFP Trust Fund grant recipients anticipate over **\$5 million** in matching funds by the end of 2019.



*The NCDA&CS Farmland Preservation Division works with counties to enact **Farmland Protection Plans** and the **Voluntary Agricultural Districts** program.*

Farmland Protection Plans:

- Describe existing agricultural activity in a county.
- List challenges to continued family farming in a county.
- List opportunities for enhancing family farms in the local agricultural economy.
- Describe county plans to maintain a viable agricultural community.
- Create a schedule for implementing the plan and identification of possible funding sources for long-term support of the plan.

Currently, **60 counties** have county-endorsed and NCDA&CS approved Farmland Protection Plans.



Voluntary Agricultural Districts:

- Encourage the preservation and protection of farmland.
- Allow landowners to publicly recognize their farms.
- Establish an Agricultural Advisory Board in the county.
- May protect farms from nuisance suits, allow for waivers of water and sewer assessments and public hearings for proposed condemnation.
- Allow Enhanced Voluntary Agricultural Districts to protect farms from development for 10 years.

Currently, **89 counties** in North Carolina have county ordinances for Voluntary Agricultural Districts. **10,183 farms** are enrolled in the program, protecting **833,354 acres** of farms and forests.
